About the Program

Elementary Education reflects what is known about the best, evidence-based practices in teacher education and is aligned with state and national standards for elementary school teacher preparation. The program prepares professionals who embody the vision of education for a sustainable, socially-just world. Through professional courses and seminars that are paired with community experiences and extensive experiences in partner schools, the program prepares teachers who (a) are "inspired to care about our physical and social worlds and have the knowledge and skills [and dispositions] to enact that caring" (UNESCO, 2005), (b) revitalize classrooms and communities by providing equitable, socially just opportunities for learning and flourishing, (c) address racism at systemic and individual levels and recognize the impact of racism on learning and opportunities, and (d) promote interdependence between people, communities, and the natural world by what and how they teach (content and pedagogical practice).

The Elementary Education program prepares professionals who are attentive to the needs of diverse students and supports specialization in one or more learner pathways (i.e., students who are learning English as a new language, students with gifts and talents, students with special needs). The Elementary Education plan of study outlines the required courses to complete the degree for licensure.

This program meets state and national licensure standards and is accredited by the Council for the Accreditation of Educator Preparation (CAEP) and the State of Indiana, State Board of Education. Admission to and successful completion of the Teacher Education Program (TEP) are required.

College of Education Pass/No Pass Option Policy

Education majors (which includes the total credit hour requirement to fulfill General Education: Educational Studies and General Education: Curriculum & Instruction) are not eligible to receive P/NP for required courses on your plan of study. Only electives and courses at the 500+ level can have a grade mode change.

Civics Literacy Proficiency Requirement

The Civics Literacy Proficiency activities are designed to develop civic knowledge of Purdue students in an effort to graduate a more informed citizenry. For more information visit the Civics Literacy Proficiency website.

Students will complete the Proficiency by passing a test of civic knowledge, and completing one of three paths:

- Attending six approved civics-related events and completing an assessment for each; or
- Completing 12 podcasts created by the Purdue Center for C-SPAN Scholarship and Engagement that use C-SPAN material and completing an assessment for each; or
- Earning a passing grade for one of **these approved courses** (or transferring in approved AP or departmental credit in lieu of taking a course).

Upper Level Requirement

- Resident study at Purdue University for at least two semesters and the enrollment in and completion of at least 32 semester hours of coursework required and approved for the completion of the degree. These courses are expected to be at least junior-level (30000+) courses.
- Students should be able to fulfill *most*, *if not all*, of these credits within their major requirements; there should be a clear pathway for students to complete any credits not completed within their major.

English Education, BA

About the Program

English Education (EGED) is a comprehensive teacher preparation program aligned with state and national standards to prepare individuals to teach English language arts at the secondary (grades 5-12) level.

Faculty have designed the program to prepare graduates who are able to develop critically literate participants in a diverse and democratic society. To achieve this goal, EGED conjoins best practices in teacher education with essential content knowledge in English language arts.

Students complete extensive coursework in literature, writing, and language-similar to that of non-teaching English majors but broader in scope. Professional education courses are taken throughout the program, including five content-specific methods courses (i.e. *how to teach* various aspects of English). Field experiences in local secondary schools are built in each semester of the program, culminating in a full semester of student teaching.

This program meets state and national licensure standards and is accredited by the Council for the Accreditation of Educator Preparation (CAEP) and the State of Indiana, State Board of Education. Admission to and successful completion of the Teacher Education Program (TEP) are required.

Social Studies Education (SSED) is a comprehensive teacher preparation program aligned with state and national standards to prepare individuals to teach a variety of social studies subjects at the secondary (grades 5-12) level.

Faculty have designed SSED to prepare graduates who are able to develop informed and active participants in a diverse and democratic society. To achieve this goal, SSED reflects both best practices in teacher education and an emphasis on essential content knowledge.

Students complete extensive coursework in three areas: Historical Perspectives, Economics, and Government/Citizenship, and introductory coursework in the remaining social studies content areas. Students may also choose to complete additional concentrations in Psychology and/or Sociology. Civics Literacy Proficiency Requirement

About the Program

Special Education meets the unique needs of individuals with disabilities by preparing professionals with the knowledge, disposition, and skills necessary to effectively serve individuals with diverse needs. The undergraduate program is grounded in evidence-based practices that emphasizes (a) creating connections between subject matter knowledge and teaching, (b) valuing the diverse characteristics of students and the ability to address the needs of all students, and (c) understanding the contextual aspects of teaching (e.g., the organizational and policy context).

The program links courses with field experiences in partner school and non-school settings. Particular attention is given to specialized skills to meet the individual needs of students with disabilities - serving students in various school and community settings; developing Individualized Education Programs (IEPs); engaging in data-driven decision making; and developing instructional, material and environmental modifications. All of these competencies are beyond the knowledge required for general educators.

A Special Education P-12 graduate is qualified to teach children with or at risk for disability who require mild to intense supports from kindergarten through grade 6 (K-6). Graduates are prepared to support students across a continuum of placements and to collaborate with a variety of professionals to meet the needs of students. The Special Education P-12 Plan of Study outlines the required courses to complete the degree for licensure. This program meets state and national licensure standards and is accredited by the Council for the Accreditation of Educator Preparation (CAEP) and the State of Indiana, State Board of Education. Admission to and successful completion of the Teacher Education Program (TEP) are required.

The inclusion program leverages and extends competencies of elementary teachers to build effective instruction and support for all learners.

The Civics Literacy Proficiency activities are designed to develop civic knowledge of Purdue students in an effort to graduate a more informed citizenry. For more information visit the Civics Literacy Proficiency website.

Students will complete the Proficiency by passing a test of civic knowledge, and completing one of three paths:

- Attending six approved civics-related events and completing an assessment for each; or
- Completing 12 podcasts created by the Purdue Center for C-SPAN Scholarship and Engagement that use C-SPAN material and completing an assessment for each; or
- Earning a passing grade for one of **these approved courses** (or transferring in approved AP or departmental credit in lieu of taking a course).

Upper Level Requirement

- Resident study at Purdue University for at least two semesters and the enrollment in and completion of at least 32 semester hours of coursework required and approved for the completion of the degree. These courses are expected to be at least junior-level (30000+) courses.
- Students should be able to fulfill *most*, *if not all*, of these credits within their major requirements; there should be a clear pathway for students to complete any credits not completed within their major.

Successful completion of all Teacher Education Program (TEP) Requirements, including a minimum 2.5 Teacher Education Overall GPA are required to progress beyond each TEP Milestone. All Professional Education courses, including Learner Specialty Concentration/Pathway courses, must be completed with no grade lower than a "C" and no "I" (Incompletes). Degree requirements must be fulfilled to qualify for TEP completion. A minimum passing score on all required licensure examinations and completion of licensure requirements are necessary to be eligible for an Indiana Instructional Educator License.

Requirements for Admission to TEP: Direct

Admission to the Teacher Education Program (TEP) is directly granted upon a student's acceptance and enrollment at Purdue University, West Lafayette. *Teacher Education Program guidelines and requirements are determined by students catalog admission year. Subscribe via Brightspace to the *Teacher Education Program Guidelines, Requirements, & Resources* course for a complete listing of TEP and licensure guidelines and requirements. Any course substitutions must fulfill associated key assessments, degree requirements, and licensure requirements. <u>Prior approval by the Office of Teacher Education and Licensure is required.</u>

Requirements for TEP Milestone A: Methods Qualified (Semester 2-4)

- Achieve the Teacher Education Program Overall GPA requirement 2.5/4.0 (at time of Milestone A review) with Professional Education and Learner Specialty Concentration/Pathway course grades "C" or higher, no "I" (Incomplete), no "Pass/Fail" outside of Spring 2020 COVID exceptions.
- Fulfill degree requirements as projected.
- Successful progression in Foundation Courses[1] and associated Foundation Portfolio Common Assessments.
- Successfully complete at least three (3) Ti-BOT badges as part of the **Ti-BOT Licensure requirement (at the time of Milestone A review).
- No unresolved Professional Dispositions (D2) issues/concerns.
- Adhere to the Criminal Background Check Policy.
- Attend the mandatory TEP Orientation hosted by the Office of Teacher Education and Licensure (OTEL). Students are encouraged to attend the TEP Orientation in their first semester of enrollment at Purdue University.

- Fulfill degree requirements as projected.
- Be in good standing with the University (at time of Milestone B review).
- Successful progression in Foundation Courses¹ and associated Foundation Portfolio Common Assessments.
- Successfully complete at least five (5) total Ti-BOT badges as part of the **Ti-BOT Licensure requirement (at the time of Milestone B review).
- No unresolved Professional Disposition (D2) issues/concerns.

- Attend the mandatory Student Teaching Clinical Acceptance Process (CAP) Workshop provided by the Office of Clinical Practice (OCP) AND submit your CAP Application as directed by OCP.

- Target met on completed Foundations Portfolio.
- Successfully complete ten (10) total **Ti-BOT badges as part of the Ti-BOT Licensure requirement (at the time of Milestone C review).
- Successful completion of all Professional Education (including all Foundations Courses with linked Foundations Portfolio Common Assessments and *Restricted Methods Courses), *Learner Specialty Concentration/Pathway, and degree courses is required prior to Student Teaching (Semester Eight). *Program limitations restrict additional courses to be taken simultaneously with or following student teaching without advance authorization.*

An official score report from ETS Praxis must be received by the Office of Teacher Education and Licensure prior to <u>December 1</u> for Spring Student Teaching and <u>July 1</u> for Fall Student Teaching. Students need to code Purdue University, West Lafayette (1631) as both the attending institution AND as a score recipient for ALL exam attempts.
- Adhere to the Criminal Background Check Policy.

Requirements for TEP Milestone D: TEP Completion (Semester 8)

- Achieve Teacher Education Program overall GPA requirement 2.5/4.0 (at time of Milestone D review) with Professional Education and Learner Specialty Concentration/Pathway course grades "C" or higher, no "I" (Incomplete), no "Pass/Fail" outside of Spring 2020 COVID exceptions.
- Verify degree is conferred on Transcript/Academic Record.
- Be in good standing with the University (at time of Milestone D review).
- No unresolved Professional Dispositions (D2) issues/concerns.
- Successful completion and target met on all Common Assessments2.

Requirements for TEP Milestone E: Licensure Eligible

- Successfully complete the required ETS Praxis content exam(s) and pedagogy exam. An official score report from ETS Praxis must be received by the Office of Teacher Education and Licensure prior to licensure recommendation. Students need to code Purdue University, West Lafayette (1631) as both the attending institution AND as a score recipient for ALL exam attempts.
- For all *Career and Technical Education (CTE) majors ONLY- Verify that the required number of clock hours has been completed and received by your advisor. *Students must complete 4,000 clock hours of successful employment in the appropriate CTE area, or 1,500 clock hours of supervised work in the appropriate CTE area under an approved Teacher Education Program or an equivalent combination.*

Requirements for TEP Milestone F: Licensure Action(s)

- Milestones A-E met.
- Complete and upload with your Indiana License Application CPR/Heimlich Maneuver/AED certification or card (must include a hands-on, face-to-face skills demonstration).
- Complete and upload with your Indiana License Application documentation of Suicide Prevention certification (training must be at least one hour).

- Submit Indiana License Application online via Licensing Verification and Information System (LVIS) at https://license.doe.in.gov/.
- Allow one to three weeks (given all licensure criteria are met) for Purdue University to certify and the Indiana Department of Education (IDOE) to grant the Indiana License.
- After receipt of an Indiana License, apply for out-of-state licensure (*if desired*).

The Office of Teacher Education and Licensure (OTEL) maintains a student's licensure portfolio for life and can provide assistance throughout the duration of Purdue alumni's professional teaching career. The OTEL team provides reliable, career-long guidance on Indiana teacher education and licensure standards, rules, and procedures. Indiana licensing rules and regulations are subject to change by the Indiana State Board of Education, the Indiana Department of Education (IDOE), and/or Indiana legislation.

Technology Integration- Blended and Online Teaching (Ti-BOT) is a licensure program. Successful completion of the program results in an Indiana Instructional License in Blended and Online Teaching. The Blended and Online Teaching License will reflect the same grade range as the student's Teacher Education Program and major.

The Blended and Online Teaching License requirements are embedded into coursework for all Teacher Education Undergraduate and Graduate Special Education majors. The Ti-BOT program is a competency-based program. There are 10 competencies students are expected to master upon program completion. These competencies are derived from the Indiana Department of Education Blended and Online Teaching standards and aligned with the International Society for Technology in Education (ISTE) standards.
